Society Comments on Delayed CABG Bundle

STS has <u>submitted comments on a decision</u> by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) to delay implementation of a rule that would create a mandatory bundled payment for coronary artery bypass grafting surgery in certain areas of the country. The Society expressed appreciation for the delay, but also noted its continued objection to the mandatory nature of the program and suggested other ways to improve the program, such as by combining the clinical information in the STS National Database with claims data.

STS Joins Letters on Data Collection, Tobacco Policy, CMMI

The Society recently signed multiorganizational letters that:

- Asked Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Tom Price, MD and CMS
 Administrator Seema Verma to <u>clarify new data collection requirements</u> relating to the
 10- and 90-day global surgical periods. The letter requested that CMS share a detailed
 plan for data validation and assure providers that claims submitted with the required data
 are correctly processed and paid. Previous STS advocacy efforts helped limit the scope
 of the data collection from every physician in every state to only a sample of physicians
 in nine states.
- Urged House and Senate Appropriations Committee leaders to <u>reject policy riders</u> that would exclude certain tobacco products from Food and Drug Administration oversight, as well as cut the budget for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Office on Smoking and Health by 50%;
- Requested that HHS Secretary Price consider the core principles of the Healthcare Leaders for Accountable Innovation in Medicare (AIM), a coalition that was established to encourage oversight of the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation and support its mission of developing value-driven health care payment models. STS joined the steering committee of the AIM Coalition last year.

Society Supports March for Science

STS joined a group of leading organizations representing clinicians, laboratory researchers, and physician-scientists committed to improving patient care in a <u>statement of support for the March for Science</u> and its nonpartisan call for the appreciation of scientific evidence, education, and investment. The March took place this past Saturday, April 22, in cities across the country and around the world.
