# **STS Participates in HHS Roundtable**

On June 20, Alan M. Speir, MD, Chair of the STS Council on Health Policy and Relationships, spoke at a roundtable hosted by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) regarding regulatory administrative burden. Dr. Speir discussed concerns with a mandatory CABG Alternative Payment Model (APM) that does not take into account STS's quality-based payment innovations, the importance of specialty-designed APMs, and the benefits of providing Qualified Clinical Data Registries (QCDRs) with continuous access to Medicare claims data.

# STS Advocates Add Signatures to Lung Cancer Screening Letter

At this month's Legislative Fly-In, STS advocates urged members of Congress to fight recent payment reductions for low-dose computed tomography lung cancer screening. As a result of these meetings, four members of the House of Representatives agreed to sign a letter asking the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services to avoid enacting further payment cuts.

# Society Joins Letters on MIPS, NQF Funding

STS recently signed two multiorganizational letters that:

 Asked HHS to consider participation in a QCDR through an electronic health record as <u>fully</u> <u>satisfying the Advancing Care Information category</u> of the Merit-Based Incentive Payment System, or MIPS. (Learn more about MIPS in the Society's <u>MACRA Toolkit for Cardiothoracic</u> <u>Surgeons</u>.)  Called for <u>continued funding of the National Quality Forum</u>, a private, nonpartisan organization that convenes physicians, hospitals, payers, consumers, and national experts in a consensusbased process to endorse the best measurement tools for improving accountability and patient care. # Key Contact Connect STS Holds Successful Fly-In

Earlier this month, 11 STS members and the Society's new Public Director Chris Draft attended 40 meetings with lawmakers and legislative aides on Capitol Hill. They discussed a number of issues important to cardiothoracic surgeons, including physician reimbursement, ways to reduce the resident physician shortage, passage of legislation providing medical liability reform, funding for the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, and both lung cancer prevention and early detection.

The night before the Capitol Hill meetings, Fly-In participants gathered for a preparatory dinner and to meet with Rep. Ami Bera (D-CA), an internal medicine physician, who was presented with the STS Legislator of the Year award for exceptional support of cardiothoracic surgeons and their patients.
